As an educator, my prime focus is demystifying Computer Science concepts and skills including programming and integrating ethics across the curriculum. I've served as an advocate for ethical computing, student-centered research, and first-year/first-generation outreach. My creative work, research, and teaching spans these topics including creation and delivery of courses including computational reasoning, time-based media, design, and ethics education.

My creative practice is focused on acts of contemplation, and subversion, as both a means and end to reconnect with autonomy, a necessity given the complexities present in our increasingly mediated lives. Somatic experience, digital cultures, and the natural world are research subjects, while my methods of interaction, exploration, and engagement collapse into a research-based practice which itself formally resolves as time-based media, creative coding, poetics, performance, and new media. My teaching practice is informed by my art and vice versa. I split time between Boulder, CO, and Vancouver, BC.
