COURSES DEVELOPED

JRNL 4402/5402: Journalism and Social Identity: Continuation/masters-level course building on the principles of JRNL 2401 (below). Course assignments include journalistic reporting and a qualitative research paper.

JRNL 2401: Media Coverage of Diverse Populations: Provides a discussion-based inquiry into the role of journalism and journalists in the representation of intersectional identities, focusing on race, gender, sexual expression and socioeconomic class in the United States. The study and practice of journalism in this course addresses issues of trust, power, privilege and ethics inherent in reporting across difference.

EDU 296-001: American University Experience II: Race and Social Identity: University-wide pilot mandatory course delivered in a hybrid format, with online learning materials and small sections led by Facilitators and Peer Leaders. Course materials, writing assignments, and interactive exercises focus on race and ethnicity as a starting point for the exploration of students' own complex social identities and cultural experiences, as well as for the academic study of the structures of culture, power, and social change and movements. Historical events and movements involving a range of racial and ethnic groups provide a foundation for discussions about inequality and

intergroup relations, with an emphasis on intersectionality, which in the social sciences and cultural studies is defined as the interconnected nature of categories such as race / ethnicity, sex, gender and sexual expression, disability, and other social identities.

COMM 588: Race, Ethnic and Community Reporting: Hybrid media studies and skills class focused on coverage issues surrounding race, ethnicity and undercovered communities. Taught as a Special Topics Course starting Spring 2008, and approved as permanent part of the curriculum Spring 2011.

COMM 720: Seminar in Journalism: Past, Present and Future of Storytelling: Course developed for weekend professional M.A. program in Interactive Journalism as a seminar (in-depth course on a rotating contemporary topic). The study and practice of long-form narrative journalism on evolving platforms, from New Journalism to social media to sophisticated multimedia presentations such as *The New York Times's* "Snow Fall: Avalanche at Tunnel Creek." Taught this seminar as Public Affairs in Spring 2014.
